Here is some Information about the Wildlife Corridors and mega links project in the US. There is much work being done in the mid-NM mountain region to tie into the Mega links project connecting the Spine of the Continent.

Rewilding North America by Dave Foreman is the most recent book outlining the 20 year project in getting wild life corridors identified, authenticated, recognized, and protected. The New Mexico Wilderness Alliance and New Mexico Highlands Wildlands is working with a Placitas group, Pathways Wildlife Corridors, plus Safe Passages and the Galisteo Basin Watershed Partners groups to scientifically gather the data needed to protect the Wildlife Corridors of the mid-NM mountains.
